


Is Social Media a Fad?

OFCOM Report, 2015

- The amount of time 8-11s and 12-15s spend online has more than doubled since 2005...
 ...and 12-15s now spend nearly three and a half hours a week more online than they do watching a TV set
- More children have internet access at home than in 2005...
- ...and compared to 2005, more are going online in their bedroom
- More are going online using a device other than a desktop or laptop











Breck Bednar

Breck was a 14 year old gamer who was murdered after being lured to a flat by Lewis Daynes, a computer engineer. Daynes had befriended Breck through an online gaming community and gradually building his trust, developing control and power over him to the point of arranging to meet in person. Having slashed Breck's throat in a sadistic attack, Daynes posted pictures of Breck's body and circulated news of his death on social media.

Kayleigh Hayward

Kayleigh was involved in an online messaging exchange with an older male, Luke Harlow, that involved 2643 messages before they met at his house. Whilst there he plied her with alcohol and touched her sexually before informing his neighbour, Stephen Beadman, that he had a girl at his house. Beadman then raped Kayleigh before killing her with a brick in a savage assault.


