Suitable for: Years 7 – 9

We are incredibly fortunate to have the wonderful author Tola Okogwu joining us in school for a day later this term, so for our inaugural **BOOK OF THE TERM** we thought it only right to select the first novel in her utterly brilliant superhero series, Onyeka and the Academy of the Sun.

Described as 'Black Panther meets Percy Jackson', this thrilling adventure follows Onyeka, a British-Nigerian girl who learns that her Afro hair has psychokinetic powers!

When she makes the important discovery that she can control this power, she's whisked off to the Academy of the Sun, a school in Nigeria where Solari – children with superpowers – are trained. #### More Than This by Patrick Ness

Suitable for Years 9 – 11

This is a sci-fi thriller set in the childhood town of a teenage boy called Seth. It hooks you from the brilliant first line: "Here is the boy, drowning". From there it takes you on a captivating journey full of mystery and intrigue. Why did Seth die? What happened to Seth's younger brother Owen? And is Seth actually dead? All of these questions and more get answered throughout the book. The beginning of the book beautifully sets the scene as Seth is eerily all alone in his childhood town 'dead'... but he slowly meets people and uncovers the truth.

#### The Places In Between by Rory Stewart

Suitable for: Years 9 – 11

In 2002, in the wake of 9/11, the Americans and their allies had overthrown the Taliban in Afghanistan. For the first time in decades it was possible for westerners to visit areas of the country that had been closed off by war. Rory Stewart decided to walk across the centre of Afghanistan relying on the hospitality of people who had not seen an outsider for a generation.

This was incredibly dangerous and he was regularly assaulted, he was shot at, and he almost died of exposure in the high mountains that make up the centre of the country.

One thing that struck me as I was reading was the cultural barriers that exist between people. Language is not really the problem, it is rather that the author sees the world so differently to those he meets. This does make the book a bit bleak in places, but there are plenty of moments of kindness and humour.

There is also a real hero in the book without whom I don't think the author would have survived.

I won't spoil the surprise about who that is.

This is Tia Fisher's debut novel and it is heart wrenching, sad, and terrifying. Erik is a teenager facing grief, poverty, and loneliness. He feels that there are no other options but to choose a life of crime, where - initially - he feels like he belongs.

The poetry is emotionally charged. The story is powerful and alarmingly realistic.

Although Tia did not experience these events first hand, she used interviews with people who had, including close friends, to capture the feelings and powerlessness felt by Erik and other young people in these situations.

The Outlaws Scarlett and Browne by Jonathan Stroud (Year 8 New Chapters book)

Suitable for Years 8 – 10

Scarlett McCain is a shoot-first ask-questions-later kind of outlaw. She scrapes by on bank heists, her wits - and never looking back. She's on the run from her latest crime when she comes across Albert Browne. He is the sole survivor of a horrific accident, and against her better judgement, Scarlett agrees to guide him to safety.

This is a mistake. Soon there are men with dogs and guns and explosives hot on their heels. Scarlett's used to being chased by the law, but this is extreme. It was only a little bank she'd robbed . . . As they flee together across the wilds, fighting off monstrous beasts, and dodging their pursuers, Scarlett comes to realise that Albert Browne is hiding a terrible secret. And that he may be the most dangerous threat of all!





### **NEW CHAPTERS 2**

#### Rooftoppers by Katherine Rundell

Suitable for Years 7 – 9

Everyone tells Sophie that she was orphaned in a shipwreck – found floating in a cello case on the English Channel on her first birthday. But Sophie is convinced her mother also survived.

When the Welfare Agency threatens to separate her from her guardian and send her to an orphanage, Sophie takes matters into her own hands, starting with the only clue she has – the address of a cello-maker in Paris. On the run from the authorities, Sophie finds Matteo and his network of rooftoppers – urchins who walk tightropes and live in the sky. In a race across the rooftops of Paris, will they be able to find her mother before it's too late?

We are incredibly lucky to have been chosen to take part in a programme called the **BRILLIANT BOOKSHOP EXPERIENCE**, run in conjunction with National Book Tokens and Read for Good.
