Active Minds

When tracking, teachers are looking to spot mistakes and misconceptions in student work – this is often more effective than questioning from the front as a teacher will be able to assess more students. Students are then supported to ensure they use the teacher's feedback to improve their efforts.

Our leaders also deliver some before school and after school activities in local primary schools. We have lots more events coming up this term and we are currently planning to deliver bench ball, inclusive football, archery and multi-sport during our lunchtime sessions.
