News from the Chair of Governors

Since the last Newsletter, Governors have met on the following occasions:

- Full Governing Body 11th May and 6th July
- Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM) of the Members 28th June
- Curriculum and Pastoral Committee 20th June
- Finance, Audit and Risk Committee 18th May and 22nd June
- Buildings and Health and Safety 29th March and 14th June
- Staffing Committee 26th April and 7th June
- Chairs Committee –15th June

All the above meetings were held online except for the Full Governing Body Meetings and the EGM which took place in school.

At the Full Governing Body meeting of the 11th May Mr. D. Radbourne gave a presentation about his work as our SENDCO and the work of the SEND faculty. Approval was given for a Geography trip to Iceland in July 2024 (Y9 and Y10) and for a History trip to Munich in October 2024 (Y11). Other areas discussed included the appointment of Mrs. J. Lindley as Headteacher from September 2023, Separation of Members and Trustees, Multi-Academy Trusts, the Catering Contract and a Safeguarding update.

At the EGM on 28th June 2023 the Members agreed to adopt new Articles of Association and in doing so opened the way for the re-structuring of the Governing Body into two new bodies — a Board of Trustees and a Board of Members. As previously advised the Board of Trustees will continue with all the usual work of the Governing Body and will retain the same responsibilities that Governors have at present. The Board of Members will be independent of the Trustees and will not be involved in the day-to-day business of the school. They will scrutinize the work of the Board of Trustees and be responsible for appointing/removing Trustees.

Our new Headteacher Mrs. J. Lindley joined us at the Full Governing Body meeting of the 6th July 2023 where the principal item was the Head's Report, which provided Governors with details of the work of the school since the previous such report that was presented in March 2023. We also received an update on progress in relation to the OFSTED Action Plan.

Adrian Martin delivered a presentation on his role as Head of Faculty and the work of the Modern Foreign Languages faculty. In addition, the Members approved the appointment of 4 new Members in accord with the aforementioned decision taken at the EGM to adopt the new Articles of Association. The draft budget for 2023/24 was approved as was the 3 year Budget Plan. An update was provided of the key changes in the recently published DfE guidance contained in "Keeping Children Safe in Education (KCSiE) 2023".

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity on behalf of the Governing Body to express our gratitude for everything that Christine Oates has contributed to the school community over the past 19 years as our Headteacher. We wish her a long, relaxing and well-deserved retirement.



Farewell Miss Oates

This was the presentation speech to Miss. Oates, given by Mr. Johnson, who was Chair of Governors for 11 of the years that Miss. Oates has been Headteacher at Kingshill School.

Miss Oates has been Kingshill's longest serving Headteacher, having been with the school since September 2004.

When Miss Oates arrived at Kingshill School, she navigated the waters and changes that arose with a sense of calm and ease. Miss Oates has achieved so much in her time at Kingshill School, so I have tried to highlight just a few of them:

- The school has consistently achieved good GCSE results, with the 2022 results being the best the school has ever had
- Under Miss Oates' leadership, the school moved to academy status in 2011
- The number of pupils admitted to the school was increased, thus helping to increase funding
- Guiding the school through the pandemic and lockdowns and setting up online teaching in incredibly quick time
- Leading a highly motivated team of teachers and support staff

At the forefront of whatever decision Miss Oates has made, what is best for the children has always been her priority. She has always put them first and because of this, Kingshill is the wonderful school it is today.

I know Miss Oates is looking forward to her retirement and spending more time with her husband, going off travelling and spending time with her family.

On behalf of the school, I would like to wish Miss Oates a very happy and healthy retirement and thank her for all she has done for Kingshill School.

Summer Concert



Junior Mathematics Challenge 2023

On Wednesday 26th April 2023, 55 of our Y8 students took part in the Junior Mathematics Challenge. The challenge is held across schools from the whole of the UK, with approximately the top 8% of students receiving a Gold certificate, the next 17% receiving a Silver and the next 25% receiving a Bronze.



STEM Challenge

Future Engineers in the making?

Our Year 10 Triple Science pupils had the opportunity to take part in a Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) challenge in school this term which had them planning, designing and making a robotic system to raise a satellite onto a mast. As well as getting to think about some of the difficulties in designing commercial projects like this, there were STEM Ambassadors from Lockheed Martin on hand to support and talk to the pupils about careers Programming robots, soldering, design too. construction and choosing materials as well as making electrical switches and circuits to drive the mechanisms, were all intertwined in the project to allow pupils to develop their skills.









As always, Kingshill pupils were ready for the challenge and did a brilliant job with almost all teams successfully raising their satellite, although a few needed a little bit of gentle persuasion. Claire Lyes from STEMWORKS, who delivered the whole day session, commented that this had been one of the most successful workshops she had done this year and was delighted that every single pupil actively took part and seemed to have learned something new.

Mrs Winsor will now take our winning team to the Royal Air Tattoo in Fairford in July 2023, where they will compete with other schools from across the county on another similar STEM challenge.

UPDATE: Winners of the Lockheed Martin Schools' Engineering Challenge, Royal International Air Tattoo 2023

Following the Year 10 STEM Challenge the school winning team made an early start at the airshow on the penultimate Saturday of term. They were competing against seven other schools in the Lockheed Martin Schools' Engineering Challenge.

The final challenge comprised two elements:

- 1. Design, build and program a robot that will collect rock samples deposited on Mars and take them to the Mars Ascent Vehicle (MAV) launch pad.
- 2. Design and construct a launch system that will fire the MAV into orbit. The launch system needed to be triggered by the robot.

The skills required involved programming, electrical/mechanical systems and construction skills. The team then had to design, make, test, modify and present their solutions. The Kingshill team came up with a design which was innovative, robust and reliable. Kingshill were the only team to collect and deposit all three rock samples, and have their robot launch their MAV successfully into space!

During the day the boys showed creativity, resourcefulness, determination and resilience. They were amazing and worked right up to the last point where everything came together, and they had the perfect launch! A winning team!

The students were brilliant and did not complain too much about how soaked through they got. It was a pleasure to take them to the show, just a shame that the sun did not shine on them.


