I studied the shape of the Globe



Pupils take on the Mathematics Challenge

On 2nd February 2017, 55 Year 9 and 10 pupils took part in this year's Intermediate Mathematics Challenge and achieved 2 gold, 10 silver and 17 bronze awards. Over 200,000 pupils from across the UK sat the Intermediate Mathematics Challenge with roughly the top 6% receiving a gold certificate, the next 13% silver and the next 21% bronze.

The mathematics faculty recently held a poster competition to show how mathematics is used in real life.


There were over 300 entries and choosing the best proved very difficult. The posters below were judged to be the best. Well done to everyone who took part.

News from the Chair of Governors:

Since the beginning of January 2017 the Full Governing Body has met twice, on the 12th January and on the 17th March.

At the meeting in January we welcomed newly elected Parent Governor, Mrs Smiline Amor. We received presentations from Mr Macaulay on Religious Education and Mrs Hicks on Careers Education. Governors also approved and adopted the Financial Statement and the Governors' Annual Report.

At the meeting in March we welcomed newly elected General Governor, Mrs Clemency Rubinstein, returning to the Governing Body after an absence of two years. The main item of this meeting was the Head's Report, which included regular items on Curriculum changes and Developments, Pupil Premium, Planned Pastoral Developments, Buildings, Health and Safety, Finance and Staffing. included updates on Multi-Academy Trust status of nearby Primary Schools, Safeguarding and choosing this year's Governor Training.
