News from the Chair of Governors

The Full Governing Body held its first meeting of the academic year on 8th October 2020. The main item of business was the Head's Report which provided a wide-ranging summary of the life of the school. It included a detailed analysis of the GCSE results and also the arrangements the school has made as a consequence of the pandemic. The report summarised the arrangements during the first lockdown and the current arrangements for teaching year groups in separate tutorials ("bubbles"). The meeting also adopted the School Development Plan and agreed which Governors would be linked to the Faculties, the Pastoral System and Careers.

The second meeting of the Governing Body, held on the 25th November 2020, received the Auditor's report and annual Accounts and adopted the Annual Report.

The major part of the Governing Body's work is done by 5 Committees: -

- Curriculum and Pastoral
- Finance, Audit and Risk
- Buildings and Health & Safety
- Staffing
- Chairs of the above committees (coordinates the work of the committees)

The Curriculum and Pastoral Committee met virtually on the 10th November 2020. A number of policies were reviewed including:

Accessibility Plan,

- Anti-bullying
- Child Protection
- Curriculum
- Feedback to pupils on their work,
- Homework,
- Looked after children,
- Sex and Relationship Education,
- Special Educational Needs and Disabilities and
- Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural including a statement on British Values.

Link governor meetings with Heads of Faculty, Heads of Pastoral and Head of Careers are held this term, conducted either virtually or in the school after 3:15pm.

The Finance, Audit and Risk Committee met on 15th October 2020. As well as being responsible for the school's financial policies, agreeing the budget and monitoring spending, this Committee also reviews and approves contracts with external suppliers such as catering, cleaning and ground maintenance.

The Chairs Committee met on 1st October 2020, Staffing on the 4th November 2020 and Buildings and Health & Safety on the 18th November 2020.

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

ECO CLUB NEWS

Despite the challenges the Covid 19 situation has posed for Eco Club's various projects, those aimed at improving the biodiversity of the school grounds have fared very well. Wildlife surveys were conducted before and after establishing the meadow and pond areas and sightings of butterflies, bees, beetles and dragonflies were recorded for the first time in those areas. The projects involved a great deal of physical graft so it was very rewarding to all to see such an improvement in the biodiversity after just one season. This term the club members were awarded Eco School's Gold awards for their highly commended projects.

Two of the club's members, Jack and Alasdair, presented a 30 minute talk at a Zoom Butterfly Conservation meeting in July 2020. Butterfly Conservation have generously sponsored the Kingshill 'Re-wilding' project and the members were really interested to hear about how the Eco club's members planned and executed the creation of pond and meadow environments. Both pupils also talked about their passion for the natural environment and intelligently answered questions from the audience about a young person's perspective on the state of the natural world and conservation. Jack and Alasdair can be very proud of their presentation and were a credit to the school. The presentation and Q & A session can be viewed on Butterfly Conservation Gloucestershire's facebook page dated July 2020.

We were very grateful for a visit earlier this term by Anna Field from The Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) Cotswolds, Meadow project. Anna kindly helped us scarify an area alongside a hedgerow and donated Cotswold wildflower seeds that the pupils then sowed. All the project areas have been readied for winter and we look forward to the emergence of our first bulb flowers in early 2021.

The club received an exciting piece of news this month as Alasdair learned that he was one of two runners up for the Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust's photographic competition (Junior category) with his stunning photo of mating Large Blue Butterflies at the Daneway Banks Reserve. A great end to a very promising year for wildlife on the Kingshill School site.

GCSE FOOD MOCKS

Our Year 11's have been busy undertaking their food mocks over the last couple of weeks. Below are some examples for the quality food that has been produced. The children enjoyed making them as much as the staff enjoyed eating them!













Snowman biscuit recipe

<u>Ingredients</u>

- 125g butter, softened
- 125g golden caster sugar
- 1 egg, beaten

- Prep: 1 hour Cook: 14 mins Plus chilling and setting Makes 20
- 250g plain flour, plus extra for dusting

For the decoration:

1 tsp vanilla extract

- 400g white fondant icing
- Icing sugar, for dusting
- 100g pack mixed red, yellow, black and blue ready-to-roll icing
- Tube white icing, for sticking
- Tube black icing



<u>Method</u>

- 1. Heat oven to 190C / 170 fan / gas 5.
- 2. Cream the butter and sugar until pale and fluffy, then beat in the egg and vanilla. Stir in the flour and mix to a fairly soft dough. Tip onto a lightly floured surface and knead gently. Put the dough on a plate, cover and chill for at least 2 hours.
- 3. On a lightly floured surface, roll out the dough to a thickness of around 0.5cm. Use a cookie cutter or water glass to stamp out 7cm rounds. Re-roll the trimmings and repeat.
- 4. Transfer the biscuits to two lined baking trays and bake for 8-14 minutes until the edges turn lightly golden in colour. Leave to cool.
- 5. To decorate, roll out the white fondant icing onto a surface lightly dusted with icing sugar. Stamp out 7cm circles using the same cookie cutter or glass as before, then use a dab of the white tube icing to stick a fondant round on each biscuit.
- 6. Knead together some of the yellow and blue icing to make green icing, then do the same with the red and yellow icing to make orange (alternatively, buy separate packs of each colour). Roll out one icing colour at a time. Stamp out 7cm circle of icing, cut in half and stick on for a hat. Cut a strip of another colour and make some markings to make it look like the elasticated band of a hat, then trim to fit and stick on. Repeat with all the biscuits, mixing and matching colours.
- 7. Decorate the hats with icing spots and stripes, if you like. Roll out balls of coloured icing, poke holes all over with a cocktail stick and stick on as pom poms. Mould lumpy balls of the orange icing for noses and roll out balls of the black icing for eyes. Press down to flatten, then stick on with white icing. Use the tube of black icing to pipe rows of dots for the smiles. Leave to set.

Will keep for up to five days in an airtight container.
