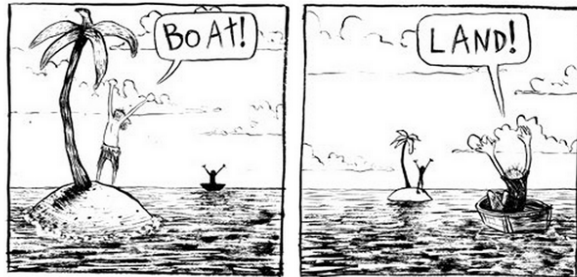

The **Eden Project** (Cornish: *Edenva*) is a visitor attraction in **Cornwall**, England, United Kingdom.

The first set of domes simulate a tropical environment and the second, a **Mediterranean** environment.

The attraction also has an outside botanical garden which is home to many plants and wildlife native to Cornwall and the UK in general; it also has many plants that provide an important and interesting backstory, for example, those with a **prehistoric** heritage.

Since 2002, the Project has hosted a series of musical performances, called the Eden Sessions.

The Core is the latest addition to the site and opened in September 2005. It provides the Eden Project with an education facility, incorporating classrooms and exhibition spaces designed to help communicate Eden's central message about the relationship between people and plants.

Disneyland Paris, originally **Euro Disney Resort**, is an entertainment resort in **Marne-la-Vallée**, a new town located 32 km (20 mi) east of the centre of **Paris**, and is the most visited theme park in all of France and Europe. The resort covers 4,800 acres (19 km²)^[3] and encompasses two **theme parks**, several resort hotels, a shopping, dining, and entertainment complex, and a golf course, in addition to several additional recreational and entertainment venues.

According to the Disneyland Paris website the theme park's top five attractions are [It's a Small World](#), [Space Mountain: Mission 2](#), [Big Thunder Mountain](#), [Pirates of the Caribbean](#), and [Buzz Lightyear Laser Blast](#).^{[36][37]}

It's a Small World is located in the Fantasyland portion of the park. It takes the visitor on a musical tour of the world while multicultural dolls sing the song "It's a Small World". The park visitors travel through the attraction in a small boat which follows a river that runs through the attraction, with each part of the ride themed for a different part of the world.^[38]

Space Mountain: Mission 2 is located in the Discoveryland portion of the park. It is a roller coaster-like ride that "will blast you on a warp-speed ride into the unknown."

Big Thunder Mountain is located in Frontierland. This is a "[runaway train](#)" through the man-made "sierras of Big Thunder Mountain."^{[36][39]}

Pirates of the Caribbean is located in Adventureland. Contrary to popular belief, the Pirates of the Caribbean franchise drew inspiration from the ride.

Buzz Lightyear Laser Blast is located in Discoveryland. It was inspired by the Disney/[Pixar](#) movie [Toy Story 2](#). In this attraction the visitor sits in a star cruiser and shoots laser beams at targets. The more targets they hit the more points they earn. This ride is advertised as good for families with little ones, even though it is also listed that it may frighten young children.^[39]
